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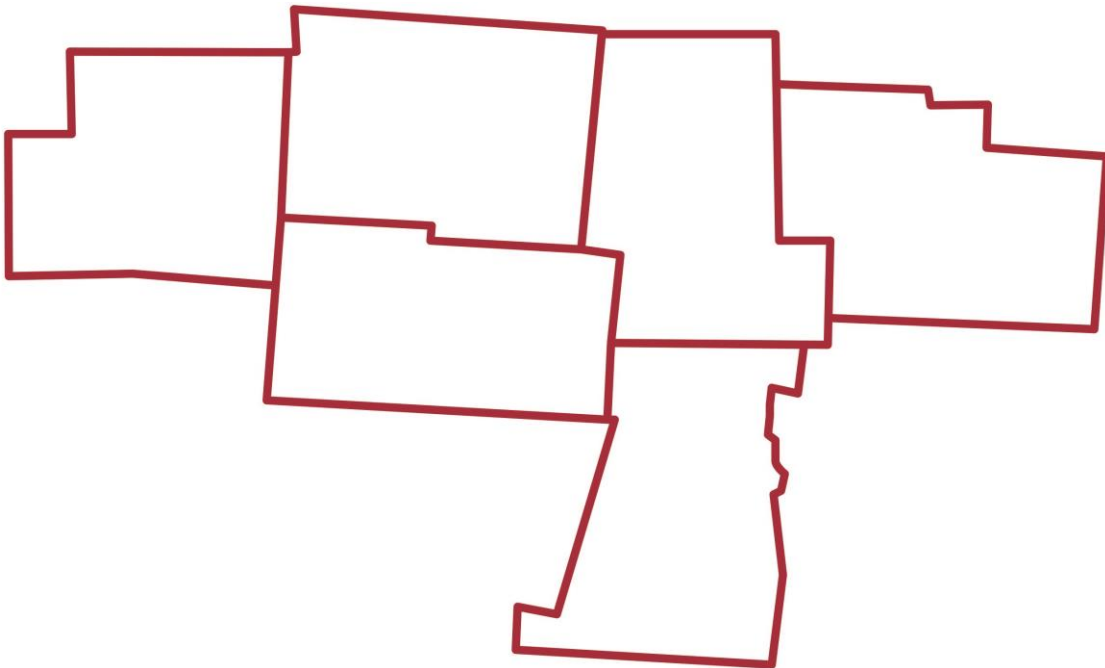


Introduction

The purpose of this report is to provide Bridges Community Action Partnership with information about the current health, nutrition and social service needs of Champaign, Delaware, Logan, Madison, Shelby, and Union. As a recipient of Community Service Block Grant (CSBG) funding, Bridges, like all community action agencies, is required to complete a community needs assessment every three years. The findings of this assessment will be utilized to make strategic and fiscal decisions that most effectively and efficiently serve the organization's community.

Two surveys were designed to collect information on the needs of eligible citizens as well as the availability and accessibility of community services and resources. The first survey was used to collect the insights of community social services organizations (the *Community Survey*) and the second survey was designed to gather the experiences of clients of those organizations (the *Client Survey*). The surveys were distributed, collected, and tabulated by Bridges.

The surveys were conducted between June 1st, 2021 and August 31st, 2021. Copies of both surveys can be found in the Appendix of this report.



Survey Summary: Community Responses

The Community Survey was distributed to two hundred sixty-five social service organizations with sixty-four responses. The respondents were mostly private not-for-profit providers (39.06%). Other responses were received from private (for-profit organizations), state government agencies, and county government agencies. A few of the organizations include:

Organization Background

Bridges Community Action Partnership (BRIDGES) is a private nonprofit organization, designed to improve the lives of low-income families. Bridges' mission is to empower people in need by partnering with them to better their lives and realize personal prosperity.

Bridges was organized in 1965 as a 501(c)3 under the authority of the Economic Opportunity Act and President Lyndon Johnson's War on Poverty. Bridges receives most of its funding from State and Federal agencies through grants including Federal Community Service Block Grants (CSBG). Bridges annual budget is \$7,966,377 with an administrative rate of 7.9 percent.

The governing body of Bridges is its Board of Trustees. This Board is mandated to maintain a tripartite structure, a format which is unique to Community Action Agencies. Bridges tripartite board consists of 24 voting members. One-third of the Board must be comprised of low-income representatives, one-third public representatives, and one-third private representatives. Care is also given to retain Board members who reside in Bridges six counties (Champaign, Delaware, Logan, Madison, Shelby, and Union) and are representative of the rural areas.

In 2020, Bridges served approximately 5 percent (19,870) of the total population of Champaign, Delaware, Logan, Madison, Shelby, and Union through programs and services in the following areas:

EMERGENCY SERVICES – Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP), Water Utility Assistance Program, Work Related Assistance Program (WRAP), and Medical Assistance (MAP)

RESIDENTIAL SERVICES – Home repairs, weatherization, and electric energy audits.

EMPOWERMENT SERVICES - Homelessness Prevention, Transitional Housing, Rapid Re-Housing, Free Tax Clinic, and Getting Ahead Program.

Population Profile: Household Poverty Rate by Family Type

In 2019, it is estimated that 5 percent of all households were living in poverty within the report area, compared to the national average of 9.5% percent. Free or reduced-price lunches are served to qualifying students in families with income between under 185 percent (reduced price) or under 130% (free lunch) of the US federal poverty threshold as part of the federal National School Lunch Program (NSLP).

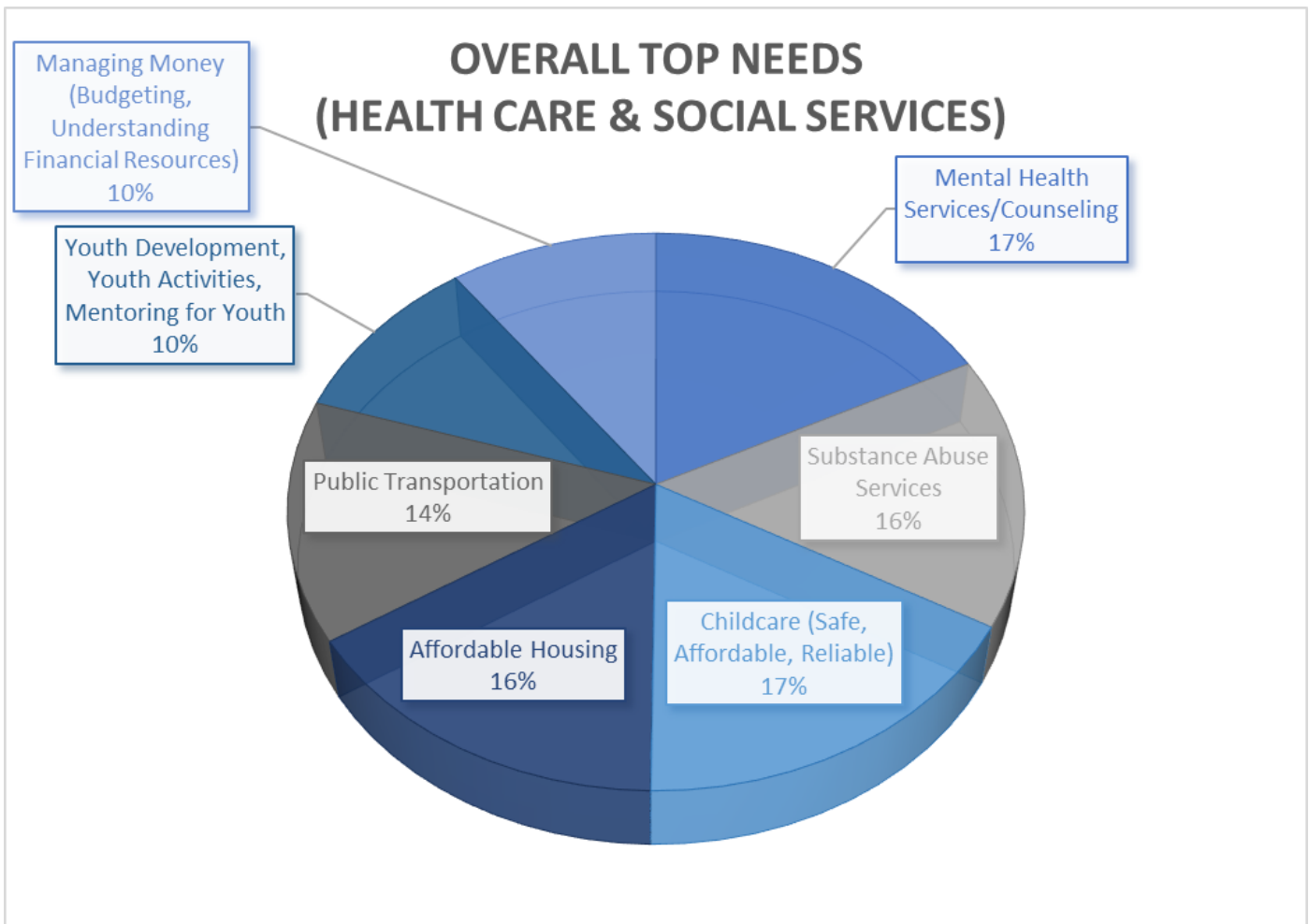

PROVIDER SURVEY CONCLUSION

In general, findings from the Community Survey indicate that providers of social services in Bridges counties named the overall unmet needs as follows:

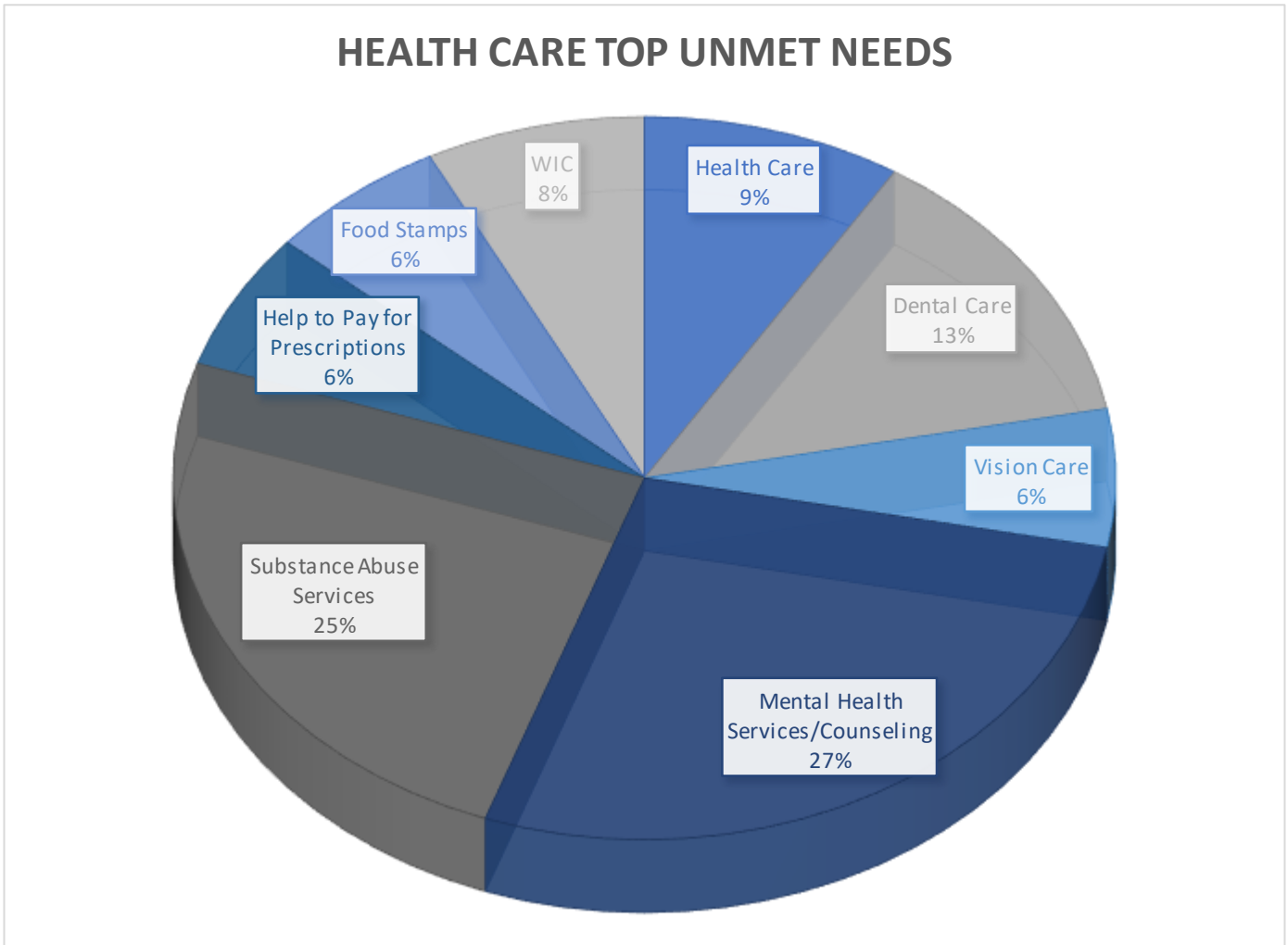
Over all six counties and categories, the top unmet needs are as follows:

1. *Mental Health Services/Counseling and Child Care*
2. *Affordable Housing/Substance Abuse Services*
3. *Public Transportation*



In Health Care:

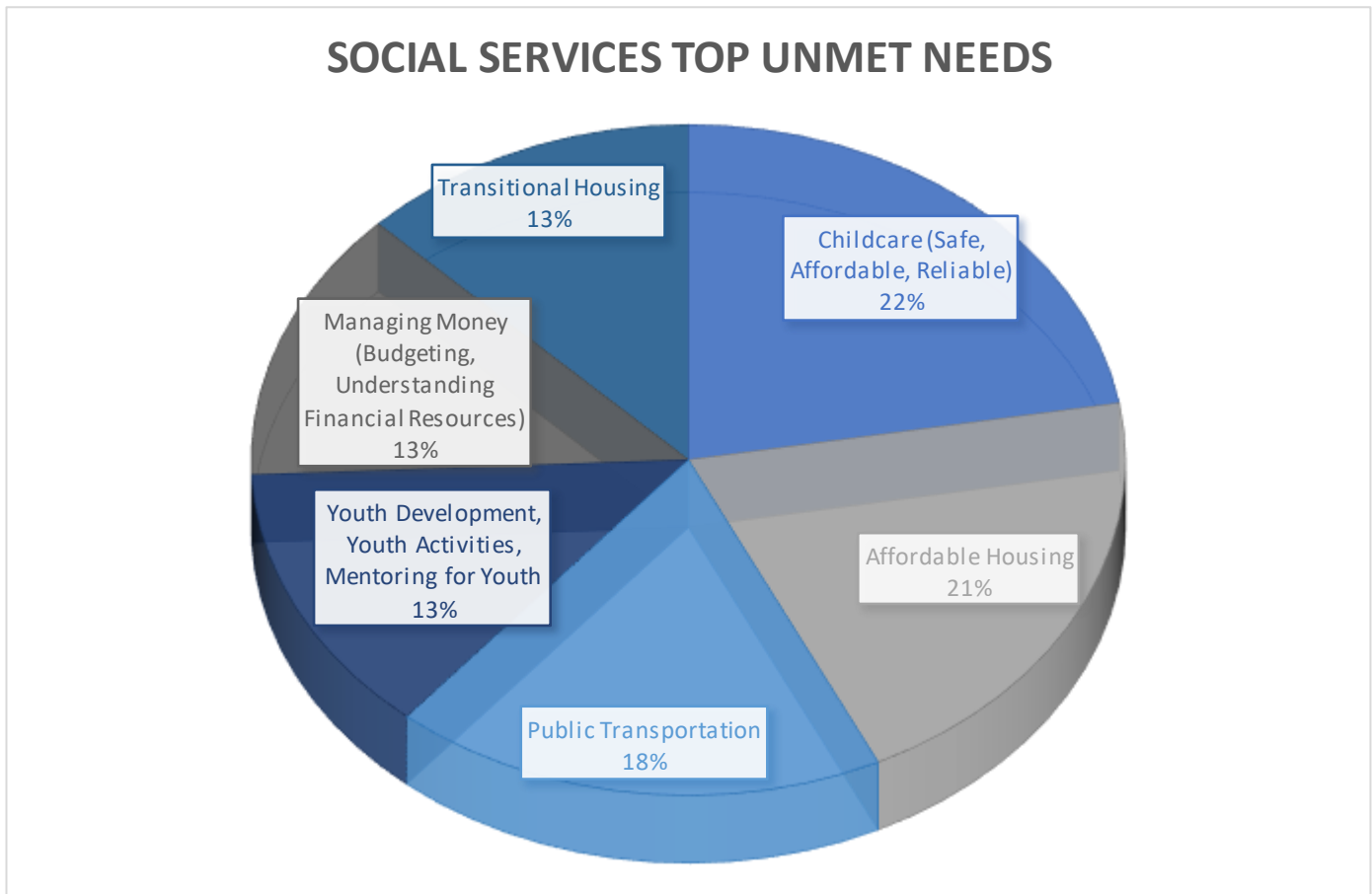
1. *Mental Health Services/Counseling*
2. *Substance Abuse Services*
3. *Dental Care*



We asked providers additional questions regarding increases in the needs of these items. The highest need, mental health services/counseling, was again the highest in the category of increasing the need over the next 3 years.

In Social Services:

1. *Childcare*
2. *Affordable Housing*
3. *Public Transportation*



Additionally, most providers think that these unmet needs will continue increasing over the next three years, with childcare being the number one most responded then affordable housing and public transportation.

We asked providers over the last 3 years if they have experienced any of the following:

- Eliminated existing programs or services due to lack of funding or budget cuts?
- Reduced existing programs or services due to lack of funding or budget cuts?
- Turned clients away or started waiting list?
- Experienced loss of funding?
- Laid-off employees due to economy or loss of funding?

Out of the 33 providers who responded to this question, 16 said that they had to reduce existing programs or services due to lack of funding or budget cuts, 16 said that they experience a loss of funding, 10 said that they had to turn clients away or start a waiting list, 7 said that they had to eliminate existing programs or services due to lack of funding or budget cuts, and 5 said that they had to lay off employees due to economy or loss of funding.

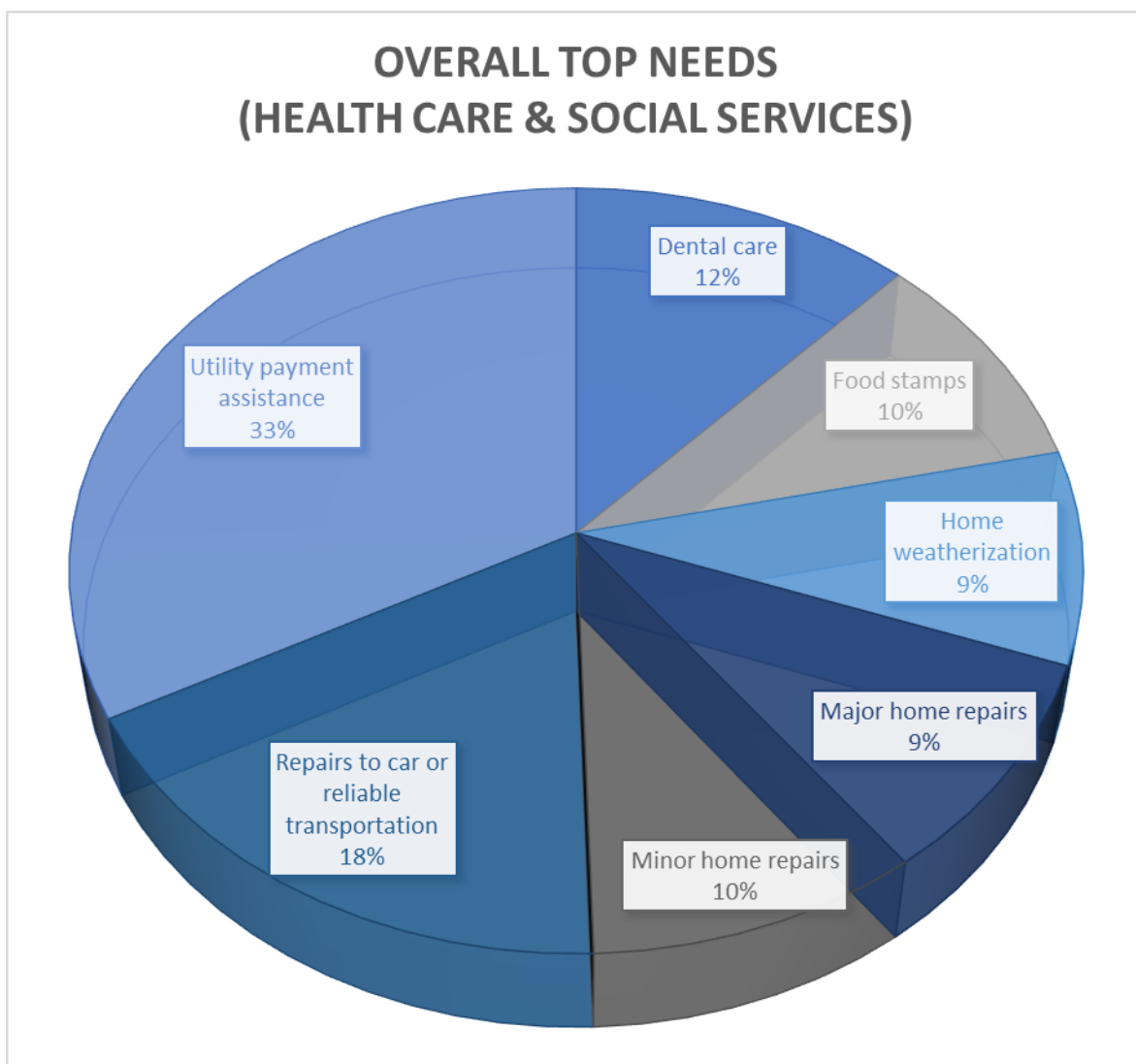
CLIENT SURVEY CONCLUSION

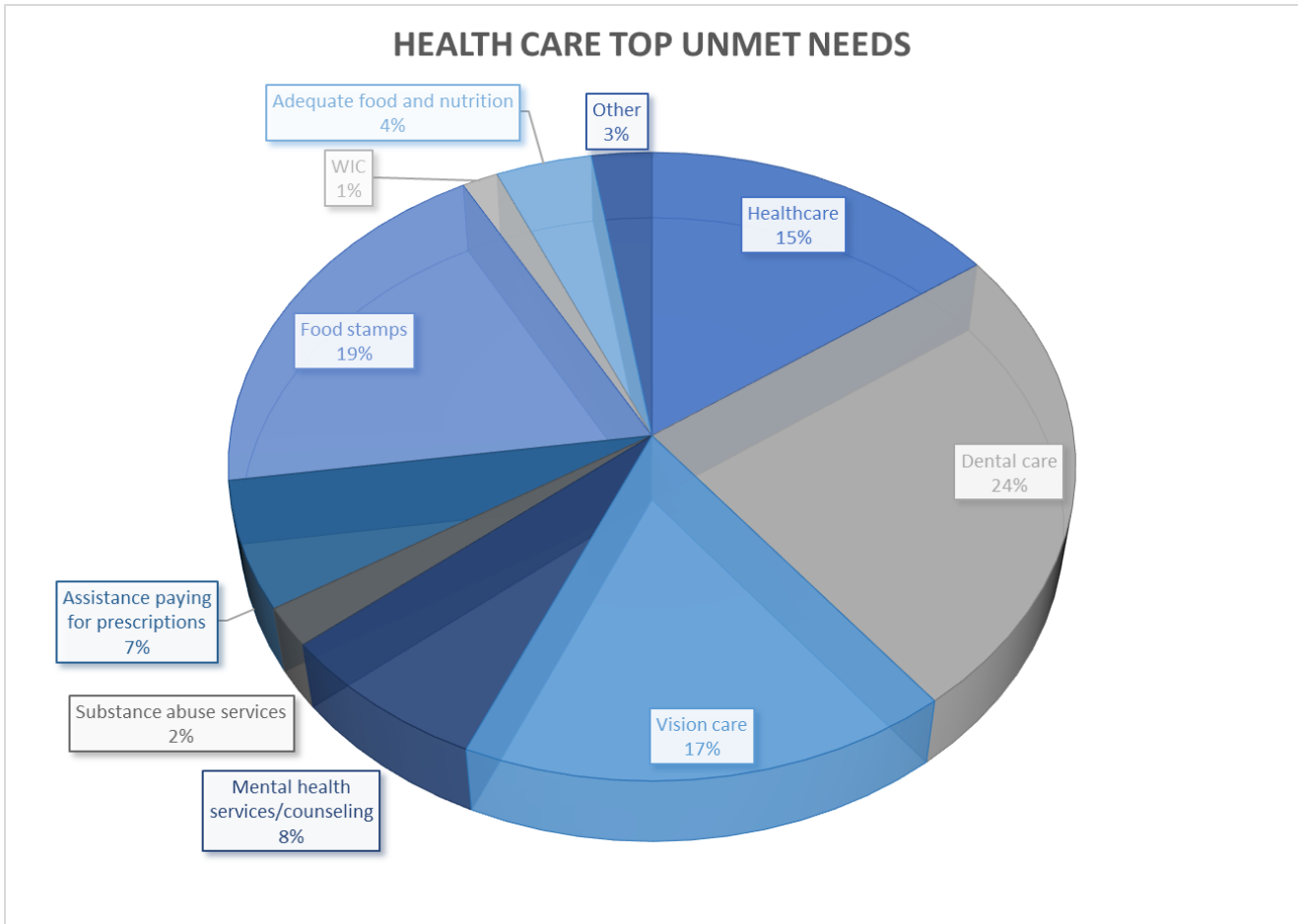
Overall Top Three (Health Care & Social Services)

In Health Care:

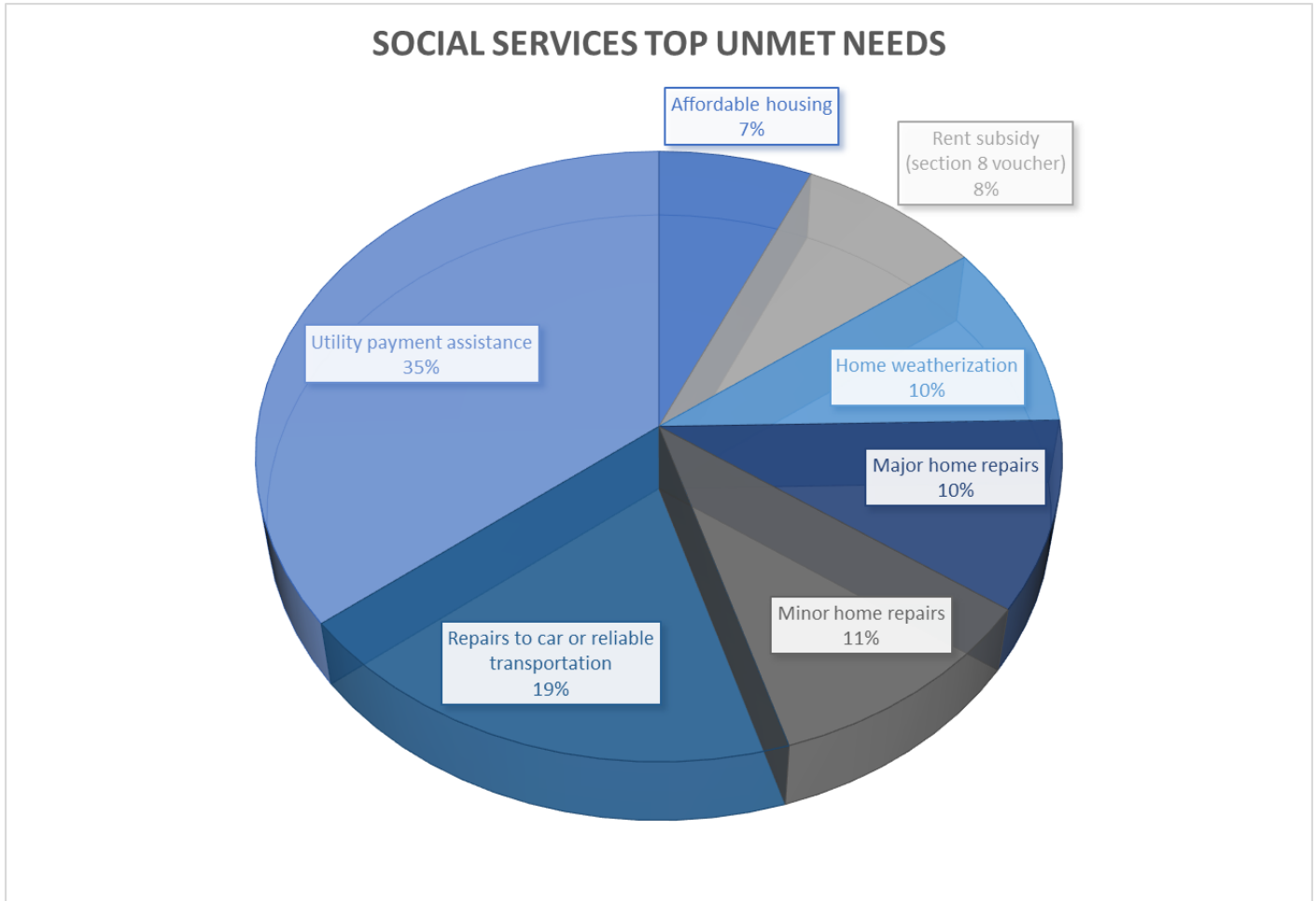
1. *Dental Care*

Respondents of the client survey named dental care, as the top unmet need over all six of BRIDGES counties. This was followed by food stamps and vision care.

In Social Services:

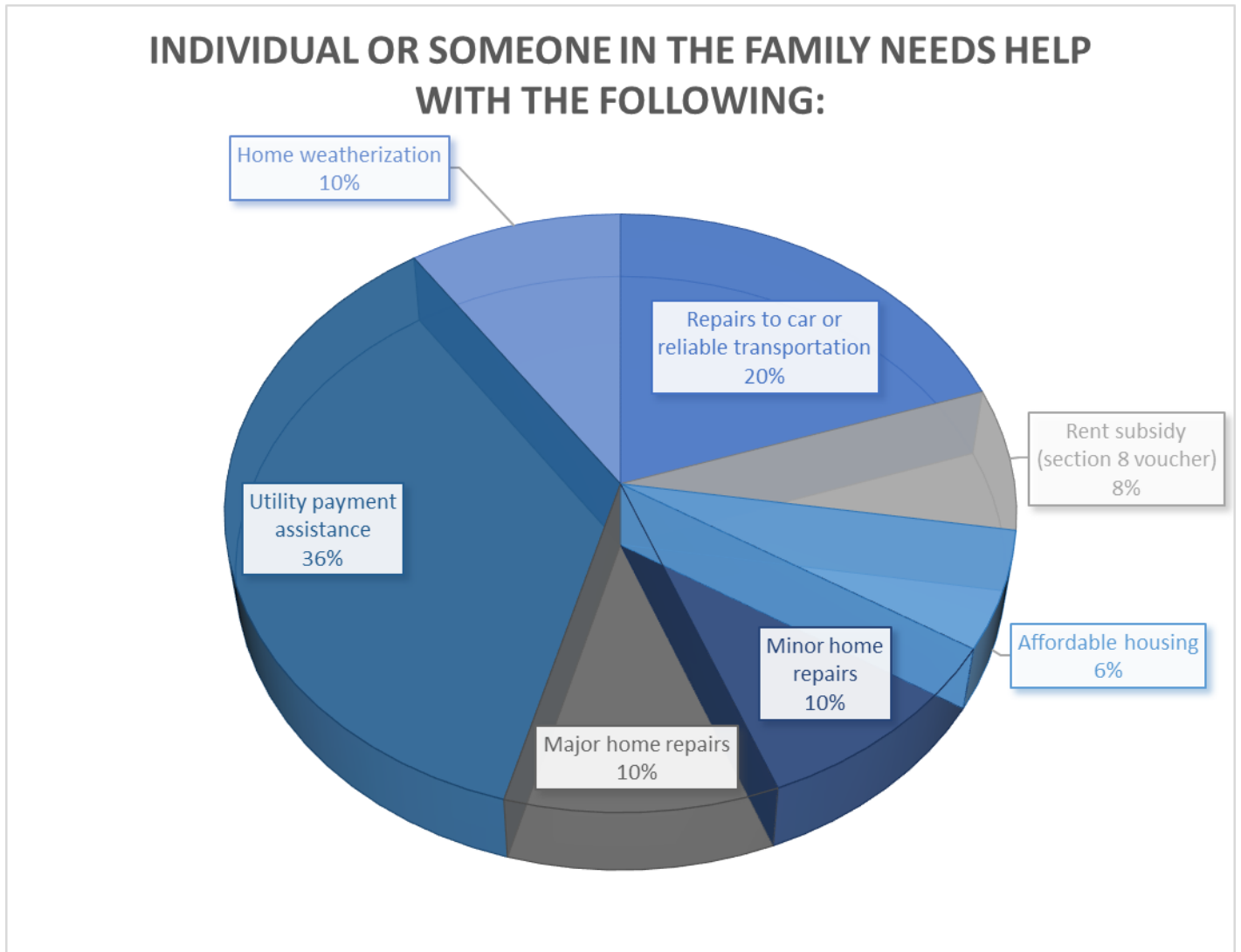
1. *Utility Payment Assistance*
2. *Repairs to Car or Reliable Transportation*
3. *Minor Home Repairs*



Respondents of the client survey named utility payment assistance as their top unmet need across all six of BRIDGES counties. This was then followed by repairs to car or reliable transportation and minor home repairs. Although we help with most utilities, there are a few that we have not been able to address until recently like water. This funding will allow us to further assist the clients and turn this unmet need around.

We asked clients “Do you or someone in your family need help with any of the following?” The top three answers received were:

1. *Utility Payment Assistance*
2. *Major Home repairs, minor home repairs, and home weatherization*
3. *Repairs to car or reliable transportation*



Respondents of the client survey named utility payment assistance as the top need for them or someone in their family, followed by minor/major home repairs/home weatherization, and repairs to car or reliable transportation.

In the Employment Status section of the survey, over all six counties, about 35% of the respondents reported being retired, over 30% of the respondents reported being unemployed; 14% are working a full-time job and only 9% are working a part-time job. BRIDGES has recognized that the community needs help with acquiring jobs and gaining skills, especially with the Covid-19 pandemic. We have recently started our Empowerment Services Department back up and plan to assist the community any way we can. With a strong department, we will be able to host Getting Ahead classes for community members who want to better their life, by gaining life skills. We hope to be able to increase the working individuals over the next few years.

To further understand the unemployment issues regarding our clients, we asked follow up questions regarding transportation, education, and training.

Regarding training, the highest response in each county was the response of “have had no specific job training.” In transportation, most have reliable cars that have been caught up on payments or paid off, however, there are a few who have no transportation at all or rely on friends or family members. In education, the most selected response was “high school diploma” with a few selecting “did not graduate high school.” There are a few who selected “some college.” This shows the importance of our Empowerment Services Department and why we have chosen to pursue this department again.

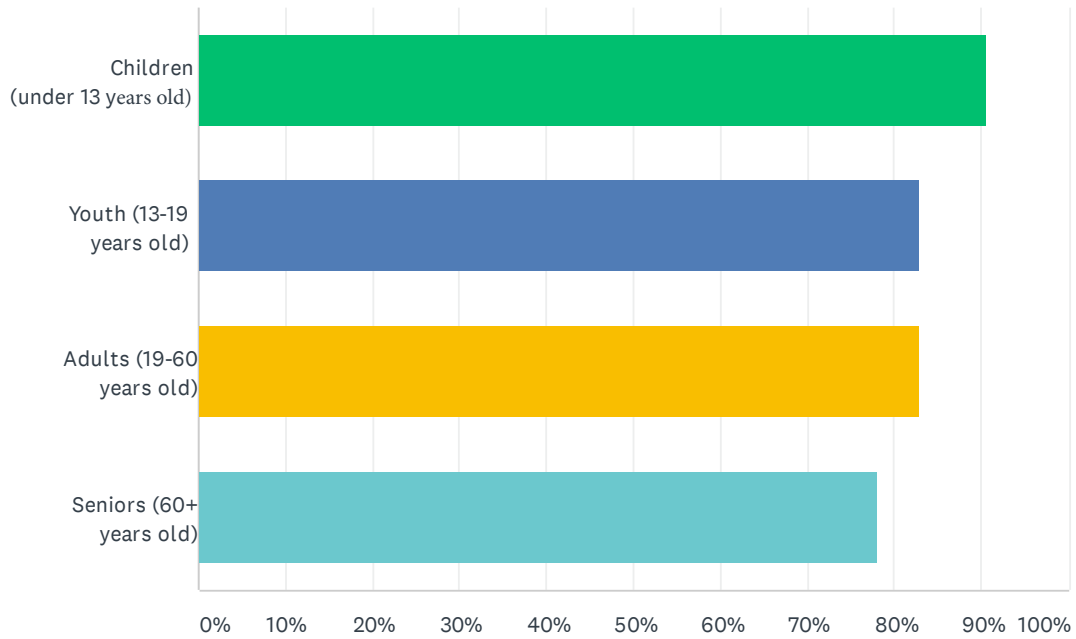

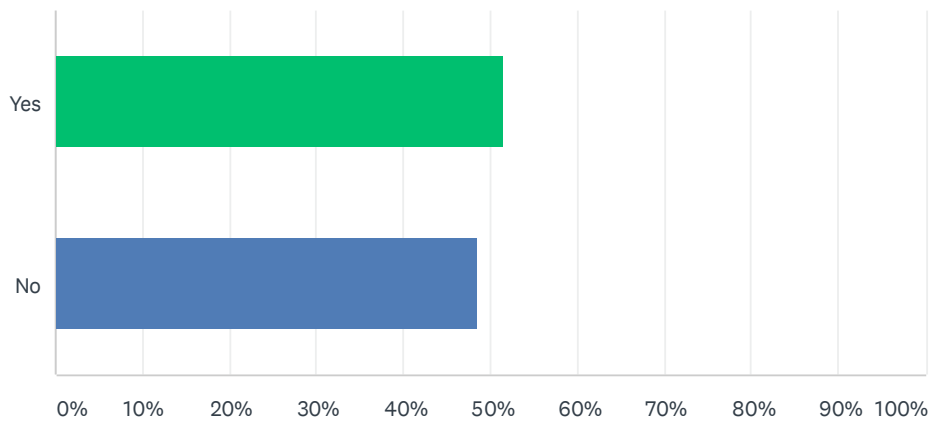

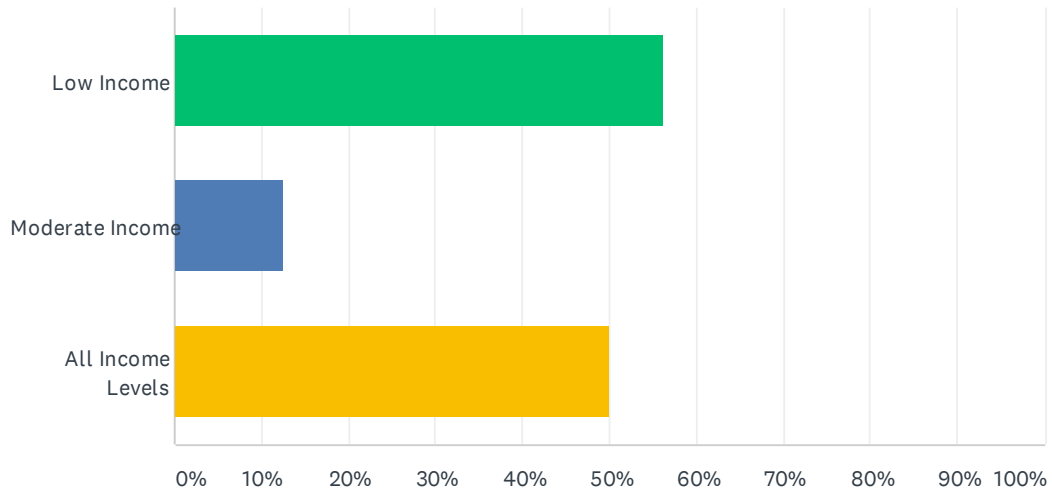
