













Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP)

The Ohio Household Water Assistance Program provides income-eligible Ohioans assistance with their water and sewer utility bills. This is a one-time benefit.



The Home Energy Assistance Winter Crisis Program (HEAP Winter Crisis Program) helps income eligible Ohioans that are threatened with disconnection, have been disconnected, need to establish new service, need to pay to transfer service, have PIPP default, need to pay first PIPP, or have 25% (or less) supply of bulk fuel in their tank maintain their utility service.

The Real Impact...

A Madison County single mother of three fleeing a domestic violence situation had been living in her car and her children were scattered with a couple of different family members so that they had a warm, safe place to be. Bridges Community Navigator helped her obtain the necessary documents (birth certificates & driver's license) to apply for assistance for Rapid Rehousing and utility assistance and connected her with Project Woman. Together they created a budget and housing stabilization plan. Bridges continues to provide case management and monthly check ins.

A Shelby County elderly woman that recently lost her veteran husband was being forced by her city to leave her home because it had fallen into disrepair and needed her roof replaced immediately. The extensive work that was necessary exceeded Bridges' available funding. Bridges weatherization team reached out to 2 other agencies (Shelby County Veteran's Administration and USDA Rural Development) and quickly collaborated resources to meet the dire need.







A 28-year-old **Union County** man was striving to turn his life around from a history of **substance abuse**. He was **struggling to keep a job** due to failed background checks and **unreliable transportation**. Bridges provided assistance with **reinstatement fees** to obtain a driver's license and **connected** him with **second chance employers**. The client now enjoys meaningful employment and has continued to **remain sober**.



The Real Impact...

An elderly woman that had lost her husband a few weeks prior was unfamiliar with the programs or what services were available because her husband had taken care of everything up until he passed. The staff in the Champaign County office conducted a home visit for this client and found it to be very hot. The HEAP Summer Crisis program provided her with a new A/C unit and fans and took care of her electric bill, which was in disconnect status. After enrolling in the HEAP and PIPP programs, she was able to afford her utilities and keep her home safely cooled.

A client visited the **Delaware County** office to use our **free tax preparation** service. He **had not filed** for the past 3 years, due to advice from a previous tax consultant. Upon examining his records, it was discovered that not only should he have filed, but he had also **missed out** on stimulus payments for two of those years and was eligible for a refund of almost \$5000 for all three years combined. As a **retired veteran**, federal funds were still being withheld from his pension, so he should continue filing each year in order to receive these **benefits**. During the conversation, he also mentioned some difficulties he was facing with his **home**. The staff referred him to the **Residential Services** department for assistance with **minor home repairs**, and also helped him schedule an appointment to explore **utility assistance** programs. The client was **overcome with gratitude** when he left, even shedding a few tears.


The Getting Ahead Program in Logan

name a few and a Lee's Chicken catered
dinner. Happy tears were shed and they
left feeling empowered and appreciative of
the opportunity.


CONGRATS TAMARA
